Minutes of Meeting
December 4, 1986

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m.

The Chairman advised the members he had received a response from Ms. Swope of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions stating a decision had been reached on the tidal gates which stated they would have to be removed.

The members were also advised they had been invited to join a meeting at 9 a.m. with Robert L. Brindamour on Woodland Road near the ice pond regarding his property and plans at that location.

The topic of land acquisition was discussed and the Chairman stated the Land Bank Committee was not making any moves between now and Town Meeting.

Mr. Barkley commented on the seminars he recently attended on behalf of the Hampton Conservation Commission. Subjects covered included establishing lot size based on soil properties as well as relating to well and septic needs - a plan which would have to be in conjunction with zoning and ties with high-intensity land mapping...a technical analysis of soils.

Groundwater protection and identification of wetlands were topics of other meetings along with leechfields, storm drainage and erosion control.

Also mentioned was a proposal by the Trust for New Hampshire Lands for a \$50 million dollar fund for the purchase of lands.

Mr. Barkley also presented a sample site plan to further explain the high-intensity mapping for soil identification.

Mr. Barkley also announced his desire to resign which was met with opposition and will be discussed further at a later date. He did suggest that the Commission should begin looking for someone to replace him.

Mrs. Palmer questioned the status on the Marsh Guide. Discussion centered around the problems encountered in printing and Mr. Bridle will have a report at the next meeting.

The members were advised the harbor dredging had been approved but that the spoils would be disposed of at a site nearby not as recommended by the Commission. It was also reported the State had concurred with the Commission's recommendations made on the Dr. Terry Bennett property. Other points of old business were also briefly discussed.

There being no further business to come before the Hampton Conservation Commission, the meeting was adjourned at 9 p.m.
