

Hampton Conservation Commission

May 22nd, 1972

Chairman Peter Randall, Stillman Hobbs, Ruth Stimson, Edna Pearl Parr, Nelson Grant, Irene Palmer and Ruth Nutter met at eight o' clock at the Town Office, to meet with the Planning Board. Barry Lougee, as Chairman of this board, introduced it's members, Peter introduced the Commission members, and the work of the Planning Board was discussed by Mr. Lougee. Mr. Cole was requested to explain some of the problems and methods of dealing with them, pertaining to the active building program, mainly apartment houses, also the requirements demanded in the construction of single homes, regarding streets, sewers, drainage, & size of lots. These requirements of course, also apply to the Apartment houses. Peter and Ruth Stimson asked the Board many questions pertaining to zoning, wet lands, filling of Marsh land, a recreation area, and their reaction to some of the Bills pending in Concord. It is hoped that the Planning Board and our Commission may work more closely together in the future, to the benefit of our Town.

At 9:30 we reconvened in the Court Room, and opened our own monthly meeting.

The Secretary's report was read and accepted.

The Treasurer reported that she was told by Mr.

Cole to write a letter to the Town Office,

requesting in writing that the check voted to

our Commission at Town Meeting be mailed to her.

Ruth did this and reported a balance in our account of \$581.02.

Under Old Business, a letter from Rhoda Peck, from Floyd Barker's Office at U. N. H. was read and discussed. The subject was the Youth Community Camp, to be held June 18-22 at Bear Hill Pond Camp in Allenstown. It was hoped that our Commission might sponsor a youth now in 8th grade thru High School.

Peter reported that he had 40 people working on Clean-up Day, and areas covered were all of Exeter Rd. to the bypass, The General Moulton House area, Tuck Field at Park Avenue, the Center School and Five Corners. Peter suggested that this be a yearly project, that Service Clubs, Schools and various organizations be contacted to assist. Stillman volunteered as Chairman, to supervise Clean-Up day, and make the necessary contacts.

Peter reported on attending a Public Service meeting, where Mr. Sinville and other employees spoke of what the Nuclear Plant would do as far as Hampton is concerned. In particular, this concerned itself with the placing of poles for the wires, preferably at 100 feet high, along the old railroad tracks, going thru the center of town. Other alternatives would be the vicinity at the end of the marsh going up Drakeside Road to the Exeter-Hampton line -- or to go West of Seabrook, then down to Newington. A public hearing will be held on the entire subject in June.

Peter received a notice that the land next to the State Pier, which we had previously written to the GSA and our Representatives about, would

now be offered for sale. This is three tenths of an acre on the Easterly Bank of Hampton River. Peter suggested that he contact Mr. Cole, to fill out the application forms. Also that Nelson Grant and Ashton Norton go down and determine the exact location. The next meeting will be held at the Library on June 8th, at 7:45. The meeting was adjourned at 10:30
