

Hampton Conservation Commission

June 8, 1972

Chairman Peter Randall, Irene Palmer, Ruth Stimson, Nelson Grant and Ruth Nutter met at the Library, at eight o'clock.

The Secretary's report was read and accepted.

The Treasurer reported the amount in the bank as unchanged from last month-- \$581.02

Under old business, Nelson Grant stated that a letter had been sent to Mr. Rolland B. Handley in Philadelphia, concerning the Coast Guard property near the Smith and Gilmore Pier.

This letter (copy) is attached to this report.

Our feeling is that this property should not fall in private hands. Nelson is to contact the Selectmen thru' Ashton Norton, and keep abreast of the matter.

Peter reported with his meeting with the Public Service, and the Power line pole placement.

It was noted that the Board of Selectmen did not sign their name to the report. Ruth moved that our Commission did not sign the report either, as we were not a party to the discussion.

Seconded by Ruth Nutter, Peter voted against the motion, all others in favor.

Peter spoke about the October meeting concerning the Nuclear Plant, in regard to a general and or a limited appearance, and he suggested that we file for a general appearance.

Ruth noted that she had received a letter from Charles Tucker.

Noted that Donald Steever, Ass't. Attorney General, is in charge of Environmental laws.

Ruth moved that a letter be sent to Charles Amyot, Sec. Public Utilities Comm. in Concord.

of neighboring Conservation Commissions proposed


by the Town of Newington Conservation Comm. to

Statement for the Beach Erosion Control
Study for the shore of the state of N. H.

The Hampton Conservation Commission believes
that Tidal Wet Lands should be included in
Flood Plain zoning definition. We feel that
it is extremely important that the Flood
Plain marshes be properly identified.

For further evidence, see the ^{U.S.} Soil Conser-
vation Service Rockingham County survey maps
of Hampton.

We realize general erosion control is necessary
in certain areas of the beach, and we urge
that these plans be worked out from a pos-
itive environmental viewpoint. We request
that when the erosion plans are finalized,
further public hearings should be held.

We urge consideration of replacement of the
North wall of the so called Coast Guard
Station land, presently owned by the Town
of Hampton, and abutting the Ruth G; Stimson
Seashore Park.

The Committee would oppose the disruption
of the ecology of the inter-tidal zone
along North Beach, and in particular the
rocky areas immediately south of Plaice Cove.
