Hampton Conservation Commission

The September 28th meeting was held with Nelson, Peter, Neil, Ellen and Ruth in attendance; Judy Doyle attending representing the planning board.

With one error corrected, the secretary's minutes were accepted and read. Neil reported a balance of \$1101.93, which includes interest, in our account.

Old business: The secretary was given the Quit-Claim Deed of Earl Mott, to the Town of Hampton, with the stipulation that said conveyance be with the direction of this Commission and will remain undeveloped. When the missing nameplates are replaced on the memorial stone on the marsh, Peter suggested that the name of Priscilla Newcomb Mott be added to the list. All agreed to this. This land is off Drakeside road, and consists of about 2 acres.

Nelson reported that Mr. Turner, High street, had received approval from Mr. McGee's office, for fill for/constructing a second building. The owner of the Reef Motel (Ethel Bougcki?) has ^{applied for} ~~applied for~~ ^{per-} mission to fill. *Application will be required.*

Concerning the subject of swimming pools, the secretary was requested to write to the Building Inspector, and inquire as to his policy and regulations ^{for drainage.} It is George Hardardt's recommendation that they discharge in sanitary sewer or pit. If the pit fails, it should go into the sewer. This should be enforced by the building inspector.

New business: Judy invited the commission members to come and listen to the Planning board meeting to be held in the town office on October 21.

In regard to the work she and her committee have done on wetlands conservation, a district ordinance and wetland zoning, a map from James Hayden, of the Soil Conservation Service will have to be presented with their work. It is possible that because of this, Judy's plans will be set back a year. Judy gave us a suggested schedule for zoning and building ordinance changes, based on the March 9 Town meeting.

Ellen had planned for Marsh week to take place from Sept. 14 to 19. Due to rainy weather, it had to be postponed to the following week. The entire project was extremely well planned, and it was evident of the work Ellen had put into it. Those who were at the marsh on Saturday, the 26, to see Sam Towle give a demonstration of hay cutting, and to listen to his tales of how things used to be done, were well repaid for their efforts in attending. It is hoped that we might have another marsh week next spring.

The annual meeting of the State Con. Commissions will be held in the new high school in Wolfeboro on November 7. Our next meeting will be on Oct. 26. Meeting was adjourned at 8:45.
